Dear Fellow Apostles,

Can we ask ourselves "are we doing enough to help Jesus save souls"?

Pope Francis has been constantly urging us to get out of our comfort zones and to get out into the streets and to evangelize! As you might have deciphered, from our writings, we have been urging everyone to go "out" and to evangelize, whom Jesus called "fainting souls", instead of staying in our comfort zones and organizing "parties for devotees" that only devotees attend. It is time to go out and to be true Apostles of Divine Mercy!

Many parish efforts for Divine Mercy Sunday celebrations mostly consist of organizing afternoon devotions that are attended by, primarily, just devotees. We must consider how many Easter-only or fallen-away Catholics (the ones that Jesus called "fainting souls") are actually going to attend a long devotional prayer service and then attend a Mass to receive Holy Communion. Have we forgotten that the real purpose of this Feast of Mercy is for poor sinners?

I know that this is very hard to swallow by many Divine Mercy devotees, who have placed a lot of effort, over many years, to have some type of Divine Mercy Sunday celebration in their parishes. We have been observing the celebrations in parishes and have found that many only focus on having afternoon devotions, without any effort whatsoever to go out and evangelize. What would Jesus really want us to be doing?

Let Jesus be our guide!

Let's recall Jesus' words in St. Faustina's diary (#699): "I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. On that day the very depths of My tender mercy are open. I pour out a whole ocean of graces upon those souls who approach the fount of My mercy. The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment. On that day all the divine floodgates through which grace flow are opened. Let no soul fear to draw near to Me, even though its sins be as scarlet."

If Jesus told St. Faustina (diary entry #1397) that the <u>loss of each soul plunges Him into mortal sadness</u>, then why aren't we focusing, more, on those souls who are in danger of perishing? If we are truly Apostles of Divine Mercy, then we need to be getting really serious about helping Jesus to save sinners and to ease the Lord's sadness. Don't you think that it hurts the Lord Jesus when devotees haven't even thought about these poor sinners? If we truly love Jesus, we would do "everything that we can" to save sinners.

So what is your parish going to do this year? Will they be focusing their energy on saving poor sinners? Isn't it time that we celebrate Divine Mercy Sunday in such a way that will bring home many Easter-only, luke-warm and fallen-away Catholics back to the practice of their faith? Isn't it time to think about the pain that Jesus suffers when these souls are lost? Isn't it about time, to celebrate the Feast of Mercy, in the way that Jesus would want us to, by going out and evangelizing, instead of having a party for ourselves?

Many misdirected devotees are asking priests for things that Jesus never asked us to do on His Feast of Mercy. Isn't it much better for us to focus on the things that would help Jesus save poor sinners? We should be evangelizing! Isn't this what our Pope is calling us to do? Shouldn't our efforts be evangelistic, instead of, just on organizing devotional parties? Don't we need to get out of our comfort zones and to get out on to the streets?

Jesus told Saint Faustina what to do for the feast, and this should also be our guidelines. Jesus said "Gather all sinners from the entire world and immerse them in the abyss of My mercy. I want to give Myself to souls.... On the day of My feast, the Feast of Mercy, you will "go" through the whole world and bring fainting souls to the spring of My mercy. I shall heal and strengthen them." (Diary #206)

We have to give 100%!

Notice, that Jesus said to "go", and not to "stay in". He clearly wants us to go out and to get poor sinners to come to His Feast of Mercy. He wants us to do the very best that we can, and like He said, He will make up for what we lack (Diary #1074). I can attest to the many miracles that have happened, over the years, to boost our efforts to save souls. We have to give Jesus a full "100%, of all of our strength", for Jesus to perform the miracles. Please look at these <u>front page headlines</u> from one previous effort to promote the feast.

Jesus said "Do whatever is within your power to spread devotion to My mercy. I will make up for what you lack. Tell aching mankind to snuggle close to My merciful Heart, and I will fill it with peace." (Diary, 1074) So that is what we have to do; give the Lord Jesus 100%. Jesus is relying on us to help Him. By virtue of our Baptism, we are called to evangelize. Make it your business, to see that your parish does everything it possibly can, to save the souls of the lost, within your parish area.

It is time to focus on saving poor sinners, right now, and in full force, before it is too late. We can't wait another minute. How would we like to be one of those poor souls that ended up in hell for all eternity, because we weren't told about this great Feast of Divine Mercy? Do we really love our neighbor as Jesus asked us to do? Isn't the greatest act of charity, to help your neighbor to secure his or her salvation? What are we waiting for?

We already have a very good idea, what Jesus had requested, through St. Faustina, that He wanted us to do, to prepare our parishes, for the Feast of Mercy; and that is going out and bringing poor sinners to the feast; telling everyone about His unfathomable mercy and the promise of the total forgiveness of all sins and punishment; and also solemnly blessing and venerating the Image of Divine Mercy; and to perform acts of mercy. What greater act of mercy, could there possibly be, than to save souls from eternal damnation?

So how do we celebrate the Feast of Mercy, Divine Mercy Sunday? Well, the most important thing is to "bring" people to the feast. By this, we mean, to bring people to any Mass, on that day, and asking them to prepare by first going to Confession. The Church allows, for a soul to go to Confession, for the plenary indulgence, for this feast, up to 20 days, before or after; but if someone is in mortal sin, they should confess before.

Here are some simple guidelines:

- 1. Priests should tell everybody about the plenary indulgence. This should start, at least, on Easter Sunday because they (the Easter-only Catholics) can profit the most from it. Also, newspaper, TV, and radio ads, inviting fallen-away Catholics to come back to the practice of their faith, have proven to be very successful.
- 2. Priests should be generous in hearing Confessions. Extra confession time, just before Divine Mercy Sunday, can be very helpful. Those parishioners that have already confessed, within 20 days, should be instructed to make room for those that haven't had a chance to confess yet. This will greatly help our priests.
- 3. Priests should lead the prayers for the indulgences (Apostles Creed, Our Father, and a prayer for the Pope) after all of the Masses on Divine Mercy Sunday, and this would include the Saturday vigil Masses, and at any other liturgical events, on that day, as is indicated in the duties of priests, found in the plenary indulgence.
- 4. The solemn blessing and veneration of the Divine Mercy image. Displaying the Divine Mercy image actually helps people to better understand what is in the Gospel (trusting in Jesus, and the 2 rays, the Blood and Water coming from the Heart of Jesus; indicating Communion and the washing away of sins) and the theme of mercy in the other readings on this particular Sunday.

Making Jesus happy by our efforts!

We will make Jesus much happier if we focus on getting the Easter-only and fallen-away Catholics to come back to the Church and to the practice of their faith, on that day, rather than putting our efforts into having what is referred to as "parties for devotees".

Remember what Jesus said "The loss of each soul plunges Me into mortal sadness". (Diary 1397) If we truly love Jesus, we will do all that we can to help Him save souls. Let us recall the words of Jesus in the Gospel of Luke, Chapter 15: 3-7: 3 So he told them this parable: 4 "What man of you, having a hundred sheep, if he has lost one of them, does not leave the ninety-nine in the wilderness, and go after the one which is lost, until he finds it? 5 And when he has found it, he lays it on his shoulders, rejoicing. 6 And when he comes home, he calls together his friends and his neighbors, saying to them, 'Rejoice with me, for I have found my sheep which was lost.' 7 Just so, I tell you, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who have no need of repentance.

So, isn't it more important to "go out" and to find the lost sheep, than to "stay in" and have a "party for devotees"? Although praying the Divine Mercy Chaplet is very powerful, don't you think that Jesus would be much happier if he saw you walking into Mass with an Easter-only or fallen-away Catholic on Divine Mercy Sunday, or if you worked really hard and brought in hundreds of poor sinners to this incredible feast?

Page 4 Gently remind our cherished priests

Let us gently remind our priests of the obligation to reach out to everyone in our area, including non believers, that <u>Canon Law 771.2</u> requires of priests and bishops. This goes right along with what Pope Francis has been calling all of us to do. We must offer our priests all of the strength that we can muster, and encourage them to make the effort to reach out to everyone, because Jesus desires that all be saved.

We must give it everything that we have and if we do, we will see that Jesus will help us. I can attest, that Jesus will surely keep His promise and greatly multiply all of our efforts. Remember what Jesus said "Do whatever is within your power to spread devotion to My mercy. I will make up for what you lack. Tell aching mankind to snuggle close to My merciful Heart, and I will fill it with peace." (Diary, 1074)
